PUBLIC POLICY

At our February meeting member, Ceil Payne, told us about her new novel, *Dancing in Quicksand*, a story of one woman's difficult decision to leave an abusive relationship. Ceil explained that running through almost all stories of domestic abuse are the four F's that often keep women tied to an unhealthy relationship. One of these F's is finance or, for women, the lack of financial self-sufficiency. As we know AAUW has been in the forefront of advocating **economic self-sufficiency** for all women through legislation that will impact women favorably. Such legislation includes raising the minimum wage, decreasing the gender pay gap, reducing the discrimination toward women in the higher paid STEM fields and guaranteeing workers' right to earn paid sick days.

While in the 1980s and 90s, women's earnings rose and the pay gap shrank, more recently the pace of change has slowed to a near halt nationally with women working full time, year round, still earning only an average of 78 cents for every dollar earned by men and that pay gap is worse for women of color. According to AAUW, an increased minimum wage and closing the gender wage gap aren't just matters of fairness; they're the key to America's families making ends meet. Forty percent of households with children include a mother who is either the sole or primary earner for her family, and if she isn't being paid adequately or fairly, those families suffer.

Women alone cannot close the pay gap. Policymakers must do their part by passing the Paycheck Fairness Act, by raising the Federal minimum wage, by supporting paid sick days legislation.

Here's what you can do. On March 24 you can attend the AAUW Delaware's Equal Pay Day Recognition at Legislative Hall in Dover.

- At 11:00 there will be a one-hour advocacy training session where House Majority Leader Valerie Longhurst, Representative Ruth Briggs-King and Debra Berke, AAUW Delaware public policy co-chair will explain how AAUW can most effectively work with our representatives to advance legislation that affects women and children.
- Following the training session, there will be a press conference and a concurrent resolution read in both the house and senate recognizing Equal Pay Day.
- You will then be able to visit with your representatives to advocate for the important issues that affect women and children in the state of Delaware.
