Diversity Book Club Policies and Procedures

Point Person Duties:

Arrange location for annual book selection and social to be held during July or August at the end of the year.

Annual Meeting Facilitation

Facilitate members' choosing books for the following year. Selection criteria are described in the *Diversity Book Club Selection Process & Criteria* below.

Review dates and venue/s for the coming year's meetings.

Solicit volunteers for the club's basic functions.

Take care of details and issues that arise. Encourage members to share thoughts and ideas and to learn through our readings and discussions.

COASTAL GEORGETOWN AAUW (CGAAUW) DIVERSITY BOOK CLUB SELECTION PROCESS & CRITERIA

<u>Book selection</u> is carried out at an annual club meeting and is based on the following criteria: 1) diversity categories; 2) AAUW Policy and Issues; 3) member recommendations.

<u>Diversity Categories.</u> The National AAUW Diversity Statement includes the diversity categories noted below. The CGAAUW Book Club encourages book selections that reference and build upon these categories.

- Age
- Disability
- Ethnicity

- Gender
- Gender identity
- Geographical location
- National origin
- Race
- Religious beliefs
- Sexual orientation
- Socioeconomic status

<u>AAUW Priority Issues.</u> National AAUW describes three issues of priority for achieving the mission of Equality for All: Education, Leadership, and Economic Security. These issues support topics such as gender bias in schools, the stem gap, women and student debt, Title IX, the gender pay gap, global connections, barriers and bias, the future of work, workplace sexual harassment, and many other social justice and equality issues.

<u>Book Genres.</u> Book types and genres may include literary fiction, historical fiction, women's fiction, short stories, non-fiction, memoir, biography, and autobiography, essays, history, graphic novels, poetry, and science fiction. Diverse genres offer valuable opportunities for thoughtful consideration of diversity categories and AAUW issues.

Examples of book topics which meet these criteria and provide fertile ground for discussion include

- Social justice issues
- Women's issues
- The Immigrant experience
- Women heroines and groundbreakers
- Ethnic, religious and racial groups, e.g., Black, Latino, Asian/Pacific, Indigenous peoples
- The environment including animals, plants, climate change, energy choices, and more
- Gender, LGBTQ+ and identity issues
- Barriers to equality which may include aging, disability, life cycles, relationships
- Other hot topics, all of which may pertain to the present day or the past

<u>Note:</u> It is highly recommended that book club members nominate only books they have themselves already read and which reflect the above criteria.
